



GENERAL RULES AND HEALTH REGULATIONS

GENERAL RULES

- All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Waterford Community Fair.
- The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as it's judgment may determine.
- Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the fair IS NOT, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- 4. Entries will be made according to classification
- 5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette. The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from an exhibitor in the same class or, in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species. THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the superintendent, manager or secretary of the fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal. NO JUDGING ON THE DANISH SYSTEM.
- 6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the PROPER NAME of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
- All livestock entries must be in place no later than 8:00pm SUNDAY unless other arrangements have been made with the respective department head.
- 8. Superintendents of departments reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. (The Superintendents must notify exhibitors of any exhibits that have wilted or become unfit. After having done this, the superintendent may dispose of the exhibit at his discretion.)
- 9. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition, any article unfit to show may be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair, except by consent of the management.
- 10. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge.
- 11. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arena, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, Pennsylvania Fair Fund Officials, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor nor his agent shall communicate with the judge during the time of determining the awards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
- 12. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owners for thirty (30) days or longer. (Livestock or poultry entered under a name other than the owner's shall be disqualified for premiums.)
- 13. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- Over-fitting of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
- 15. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in charge of the owner or employee. The fair will have stand-by attendants available during the youth judging or showing, men designated if there is trouble with the animals.

- Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- 17. Premium checks and entries should be collected between 8:00 pm and 11:00 pm Saturday.
- 18. \$2.00 entry fee per animal/per department.
- 19. No livestock on midway.
- 20. DRESS CODE At minimum, exhibitors handling and/or showing animals at the fair are required to wear appropriate hard sole shoes, especially for beef cattle and hogs. No sandals permitted.

CAMPER GUIDELINES

- A limited number of camper/trailer spaces are available.
 Only exhibitors and volunteers of the Waterford Community Fair will be permitted to reserve camping spaces. Camping spaces will be assigned at the discretion of the fair board. As space is limited, the purchase of extra space for awnings/slide outs may not always be possible.
- A \$75.00 fee will be charged for each space
- The fair board reserves the right to move any camper that is incorrectly parked
- · Campers must use appropriate electrical cords
- Trailers not used for camping will not be allowed in the camping area
- No awnings or slide-outs are allowed to extend into the next camping space
- No dumping of sewage or grey water onto the ground is permitted

GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the fair:

1. Restraining Animals

- Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animals or restrict its breathing in any way.
- Animals should be tied so all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
- Animals should be tied so they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
- Handling Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal
 is prohibited. The use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be
 restricted to showing only and be used only to guide the animals, not
 punish them. Remember animals will respond quicker to quiet, gentle
 handling, than loud, rough handling.
- Bedding All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding, such as carpet, is used it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.
- 4. Feeding & Water Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.
- 5. **Transportation** Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.
- Blanket/Sweat Collars Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking, or lying down.
- 7. Health It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

Sunday SEPTEMBER 1, 2024 as EXHIBIT REGISTRATION DAY!

- · Less traffic and congestion at entry stations
- No admission required to register exhibit
- Enjoy the Labor Day holiday at the fair with family and friends
- Fair attendees will have an earlier opportunity to view entries.

Individuals wishing to enter exhibits for judging and premium consideration can do so on the exhibit registration day from 9:00am to 8:00pm. On arrival, please visit the entry desk in Home Show Building #1 to receive entry tickets for those items you wish to exhibit.

Judging of perishable items will begin immediately following the close of registration. Therefore, and without exception, all Baked Products entries must be in place by 8:00pm Sunday to be considered for any premium, contest or award.

In an effort to increase the efficiency of the exhibit registration process, **PRE-REGISTRATION** is encouraged wherever possible, and **required for all livestock entries** (with the exception of rabbits).

EXHIBITOR NUMBERS:

In ALL cases, each exhibitor is assigned an **EXHIBITOR NUMBER**. If you've entered an exhibit in previous years at the Waterford Fair, your exhibitor number is already assigned.For new exhibitors, an exhibitor number must be assigned prior to registering or entering your exhibit. New exhibitor numbers will be assigned at the entry table on registration day, or can be obtained in advance by contacting Entries Chairman: **NADINE MERRY – 814-796-4012**

LIVESTOCK PRE-REGISTRATION:

In the case of livestock, **ALL ENTRIES MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED** using the blank livestock entry forms supplied in the fair book or downloaded from the fair's web-site. Forms should be completed in their entirety and forwarded to the respective department chairman at the addresses supplied in the fair book or published on our web-site. **Please take careful note of the entry-date deadlines for each respective department.**

Non-Livestock exhibits can ALWAYS be entered in person on the exhibit registration day of the fair.

ALL OTHER ENTRIES PRE-REGISTRATION:

While not required, all other entries may be pre-registered using the blank entry forms supplied in the fair book or download forms from the fair website. Forms should be completed in their entirety and forwarded to Entries Chairman:

On-line pre-registration is currently unavailable.

When exhibits are pre-registered, the entry is recorded in our entry database and an entry ticket for each entry is generated by our computer system. These entry tickets can be picked up at the entry table on entry day (Sunday before the first day of the fair), or, if there's sufficient lead time, arrangements can be made to pick up the entry tickets prior to the first day of the fair. Pre-registration of exhibits is available until the **Thursday before Labor Day**.

GENERAL ADMISSION

All individuals, (including exhibitors) must have paid daily admission, purchased a weekly booster button, wrist band, or possess an official admission pass issued by the fair.

HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

 "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" – It is recommended all livestock exhibits be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (health certificate) signed by an accredited veterinarian;

PA Cattle, Goats, and Sheep: Recommended to have been issued after May 1 current year

All Horses: Required – issued within 30 days of start of fair.

All Swine: Required – issued within 14 days of start of fair.

Out of State Cattle, Goats and Sheep: Required – issued within 30 days

All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement may be pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the fair grounds. Decisions by Fair Officials to deny entry to any livestock exhibit are final and not subject to appeal.

• Veterinarian Consultation Relationship -

of date of importation to the state.

For animal species that do not have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection requirement, Pennsylvania law requires an "Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian Consultation Relationship" exists, and that it can be verified in writing. To meet this requirement, each exhibitor must have signed the Veterinarian Consultation Relationship statement located on the bottom of the fair's livestock entry form (provided in this fair book). If more than one form is submitted, each form must be signed. If the owner/caretaker is under 18 years of age, the signature of a parent/guardian is required.

- "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) OR evidence of a signed
 "Veterinarian Consultation Relationship" statement MUST be presented
 upon arrival including out of state entries for livestock exhibits.
- All animals admitted to the Waterford Community Fair shall be identified by a unique and permanent ear tag, tattoo, brand or records of unique physical attributes. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes.
- All animals admitted to the Waterford Community Fair must comply with applicable state (7 PA Code) or federal (9CFR) rules.
- Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show
 officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious, or
 parasitic disease is apparent, or if health certification or identification
 documentation is not acceptable.
- All Show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin.

Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, DO NOT USE IT!

**Open Class Animals may not be removed prior to 10pm Saturday.



DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

For PA cattle entries, it is recommended a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) issued after May 1 current year has been obtained. For out of state cattle, a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) issued within 30 days of date of importation is required.

HEALTH CERTIFICATION

- No animal showing evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease shall be allowed entrance into the show.
- All animals must be accompanied by an approved CVI and VCPR Form and bear unique permanent identification, if applicable.
- The base date for computing health rules will be the opening day of the show. Animals will not be admitted without the necessary health papers.
 Health certificate must be available at all times as additional inspections of Health Certificates will be made, if applicable.
- ALL CATTLE MUST HAVE AN OFFICIAL ID which will have a US SHIELD and includes; a USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or a 15-digit Animal Identification Number eartag starting with "840" or other USDA approved official identification. Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable.

PENNSYLVANIA AND OUT OF STATE CATTLE

If you plan on bringing out-of-state cattle to the fair, please check with the fair office or cattle department chairs for any changes in health requirements for out-of-state cattle.

VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS

- All out of state cattle should be accompanied by a CVI, signed by an
 accredited veterinarian, that includes a statement that the animal(s)
 identified have been immunized against IBR, PT3, and BVD.
- Animals that have never been vaccinated against BVD or have not been vaccinated against BVD during the previous 12 months, must receive one dose of modified live virus vaccine given at least 15 days, and not more than 180 days before the show, or two doses of killed vaccine, two to four weeks apart, with the last dose given at least 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show. Animals that have been vaccinated against BVD within the previous 12 months must receive at least a single injection of modified live virus or killed vaccine given not less that 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show.
- IMPORTANT! The date of the virus vaccination, OR the dates of the last two killed virus vaccinations, should be recorded on the CVI, if applicable.
- Hyperimmune serum may not be used as a substitute for the above vaccination requirement. No animals will be admitted to the Waterford Fair unless these requirements have been met.
- A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this requirement). All vaccine label direction must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information should be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

OUT OF STATE CATTLE

"Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) should be within 30 days of date of importation. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

TUBERCULOSIS REQUIREMENTS

• A Tuberculosis test is required.



HORSES

For all Horse entries (including out of state horses) a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) issued within 30 days of date of fair, MUST be presented upon arrival.

PENNSYLVANIA AND OUT OF STATE HORSES

- No horse showing evidence of infections, contagious or parasitic disease will be admitted to the fair or show.
- Equine Infections Anemia (EIA) All horses must be test-negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection, date of results, and results of the EIA test, along with the accession number and the name of the testing laboratory. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination
- The negative test report must be issued to the current owner of all horses, including pulling teams, and must include an accurate description of the horse including age, color and sex, plus any other reliable identification such as tattoos, distinctive marks, etc.
- Solid color animals must be identified by some method of unique identification such as a lip tattoo, brand or at least two distinct markings.
- Horses should be immunized to prevent contagious respiratory disease not less that 15 days before the show. Exhibitors are advised to consult their veterinarian regarding proper conditioning and vaccination of their animals at least 30 days prior to the show.
- A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. However, if a mare was currently vaccinated against rabies when she foaled, the foal is not required to be vaccinated until six months of age, with a second vaccination administered two-four weeks later. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificated or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

OUT OF STATE HORSES

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) within 30 days of date
 of fair. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals
 identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined
 and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis (VS). During the past
 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located
 within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- If an equine animal has resided in a state in which Piroplasmosis
 has been identified within the past six months for a cumulative total of
 30 days or more within the 6 months preceding the date of entry to the
 Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for Piroplasmosis on
 a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay
- (c-ELISA) test, or a Department-approved equivalent test, with the test
 occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date
 of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary
 Inspection.



SWINE

For all Swine entries, a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) issued not more than 30 days before the start of the fair MUST be presented upon arrival.

PENNSYLVANIA AND OUT OF STATE SWINE

ALL SWINE

- must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI or ICVI.
- are permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI:
- will be visually inspected for signs of disease immediately prior to unloading at the fair by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
- Breeding swine educational displays which are not competing may occur
 concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as, reasonable
 precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine educational
 display.
- All market swine exhibited shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.

OUT OF STATE SWINE

"Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) must be issued not more than 14 days before the start of the fair. The CVI shall include a statement verifying THE SWINE HAVE NOT BEEN FED RAW GARBAGE and that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis (VS).


During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been Diagnosed."

BRUCELLOSIS TESTING REQUIREMENTS

- No brucellosis test is required if the animal originated from a Validated Brucellosis-free Herd.
- If not originating from a Validated Herd, out of state swine must be negative to a brucellosis test within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.

PSEUDORABIES TESTING REQUIREMENTS

 No pseudorabies test is required if the animal originates from a qualified Pseudorabies (PRV)-negative Herd.



PENNSYLVANIA AND OUT OF STATE RABBITS

"Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship" form MUST be presented upon arrival including out of state entries for livestock and rabbit exhibitors.

All rabbit entries must be individually identified on the fair's LIVESTOCK ENTRY FORM, found in this book.

The form must be signed by the animals' owner.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is not required for Pennsylvania rabbit entries.

- Rabbits will be screened on arrival for health and show condition.
- No rabbits showing signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to the show.
- Department superintendents have the final judgment in resolving any dispute.

OUT OF STATE RABBITS

No out of state rabbits will be admitted to this year's fair.

SHEEP

For all Sheep entries, it is recommended a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) issued after May 1 current year (within 30 days of date of importation for out of state sheep) has been obtained.

PENNSYLVANIA AND OUT OF STATE SHEEP

HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

To qualify, all animals must be free of any evidence of transmissible disease, including external parasites, sore mouth, and foot rot, and be clearly identified on an official CVI, if applicable. A copy of the CVI should accompany the sheep to the fair and be available for inspection at all times during the fair as additional inspections of sheep health certificates will be made.

- Identification Purebred animals must be identified by registry name and number, corresponding to the ear tag or tattoo number. Grade animals must be identified by farm-flock number, corresponding to the ear-tag or tattoo number.
- Flock Inspection If applicable for health chart, flocks must be examined
 after May 1, current year. The veterinarian who has examined the entries
 and the flocks from which they come must certify on the health certificate
 that he has found no evidence of transmissible disease and to the
 best of his knowledge, no exposure thereto, and are not subject to any
 quarantine restrictions.
- IMPORTANT RULE Certification by the owner and an accredited veterinarian that the identified animal(s) is (are not) known to have been exposed to scrapie.
- Dipping Not required of sheep entries from officially recognized scrapies free areas; all other sheep must be dipped in an officially permitted solution within 10 days of the opening date of the fair.
- Shipping Fever Complex It is recommended that all sheep, except those consigned to immediate slaughter, be properly immunized before shipment to the fair.
- Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required.
 Official scrapie ID includes:
 - A. A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
 - B. A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or
 - C. having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate listing the current owner (copy acceptable) accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of origin.
- A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination recommendation).
 All vaccine label directions should be followed, and all rabies vaccinated sheep should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information should be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

OUT OF STATE SHEEP

 A "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) should be issued within 30 days prior to entry into PA. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis (VS). During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

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GOATS

For all Goat entries, it is recommended a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Form" (CVI) issued after May 1 current year (within 30 days of date of importation for out of state goats) has been obtained.

PENNSYLVANIA AND OUT OF STATE GOATS

- Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - 1. USDA ear tag which will have a US SHIELD; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or
 - 3. Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of origin.
- All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI, if applicable.
- All drug and vaccine label directions should be followed, included but not limited to milk and slaughter withdrawal periods.
- Must have official scrapie tag or ID.
- Open to 4-H & FFA Members only.
- Market goats must be castrated by the date animal is tagged.
- Decisions made by officials are final and not appealable.

OUT OF STATE GOATS

"Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) should be issued within 30 days prior to entry into PA. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis (VS). During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

Tuberculosis Testing requirements:

- No test is required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be test negative within the 60 days prior to importation. The negative test results and date of the test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative laboratory test report (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable.)
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age or older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative laboratory test report (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable)

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. All entries for beef cattle must be made by August 19th by contacting the chairman. A list of the classes in which you will be showing is required. All beef cattle must be in no later than 9:00 P.M. on Sunday preceding the fair. Send entries with a check made payable to The Waterford Fair Association, \$2.00 per animal to: Char Proctor, 10065 Kidder Rd, Cranseville, PA 16410. No beef cattle may be removed before 10:00pm Saturday evening or prizes will be forfeited.
- See "Health Rules and Regulations Dairy and Beef Cattle"
- All breeding cattle entered must be registered in the registry association for the respective breed as the property of the exhibitor. All cattle must be at least 3/4 blood to be shown as a breed. Registration papers will be checked upon arrival of cattle to fairgrounds. Registration papers must be presented on animals over 6 months of age, animals younger than 6 months registration papers of dam and sire must be presented if the animal's papers have not been processed. Registration papers for breeding beef (except commercial) must be available and ready to verify against the permanent identification (tattoo/brand) on Sunday evening beginning at 9 p.m. in the beef barn at the exhibitors stall area.
- All breeding cattle entered must be checked in before 9:00pm, Sunday. Registration papers must be present.
- 5. The chairman reserves the right to bar from competition animals of decidedly inferior conformation of type or condition and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 6. Exhibitors will be expected to display their animals as directed by the chairman; to accept the stall assigned without controversy; to keep their animals in an attractive appearance and to cooperate with the department.
- 7. Exhibitors of beef cattle must inform themselves as to when their cattle will be judged. Cattle must be in the ring promptly on call and failure to appear could result in disqualification. Display of ribbons and/or awards previously won by cattle at other shows will be prohibited
- Judging of beef cattle will be Wednesday. Breeding cattle will begin at 2:00 P.M., Feeder class at 5:00 P.M. followed by Market Beef classes at 6:00 P.M.

- 9. Neck ties are required. Nose rings are required for classes 4, 5, 6, 7.
- 10. In the event of no competition in any class, a ribbon and premium is awarded at the discretion of the judge.
- 11. The decision of the judge will be final in all cases, except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the chairman and beef committee will make the decision.
- 12. All exhibits will be under the control and direction of the livestock committee, but the Fair Association will in no case be responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from any animal exhibited by the exhibitor
- 13. The Fair Board will put forth every effort to protect all exhibits, but all exhibitors of livestock will be responsible for the care and feeding of the animals and also daily removal of manure from the barns and tents.
- 14. No alcoholic beverages are permitted in barns or barn area. Smoking in the barns and tents is forbidden by rules and regulations of the Fair
- 15. All entries must be owned by the exhibitor for at least 30 days prior to the closing date for entries.
- 16. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under proper halter and in charge of the owner or owner's representative. Animals that cannot be properly controlled and present a threat to other exhibitors and/or spectators will be barred from competition at the discretion of the judge and/or the chairman. There will be people available to assist junior exhibitors when necessary.
- 17. Limit one entry only in either Market or Feeder Beef classes per exhibitor. Limit two entries per exhibitor in any one breeding class.

18. All market and Feeder Heifers born before December 1, 2023 must have a CVI certification as open within 30 days of opening date of the fair.





Department 10 – 4H & FFA LIVESTOCK YOUTH EXHIBITS

ELIGIBILITY: 4-H Club members must have passed their 8th birthday but not have passed their 19th birthday by January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors must be members of a regularly organized 4-H Club, carrying a project in the field they wish to make entry and be under the supervision of the Pennsylvania State University Agricultural and Home Economic Extension Service by July 1 preceding the fair. Exhibits must have been selected through an elimination.

Students enrolled in an accepted vocational school curriculum must be conducting a project in the class in which they wish to make an entry. Students enrolled in general home economics in a comprehensive high school are considered as qualifying. All entries shall be approved prior to the fair by a member of the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Agriculture or Home Economics staff, or their designated representative.

4H and FFA FITTING & SHOWMANSHIP

4-H and FFA members may show either a market or breeding animal in the fitting and showmanship classes. The animal must be a 4-H/FFA project animal that the exhibitor has exhibited in a 4-H/FFA Class. The exhibitor must show the same animal in both contests. The Erie County 4-H/FFA Livestock Northwest Regional Rules and IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics as provided by the Erie County Livestock Committee will apply throughout the fitting and showmanship classes. If it is determined by the 4-H/FFA Livestock Selection Committee an exhibitor has violated provisions of this code regarding fitting or other practices, the exhibitor will not be permitted to sell through the 4-H /FFA Livestock Sale at the Waterford Fair.

BEEF FITTING AND SHOWMANSHIP CONTESTS

Exhibitors will fit their animals in the presence of a judge in accordance with the following additional rules that govern beef cattle fitting and showmanship contests.

- 1. All age groups will have 10 minutes to fit the right side of their animals.
- Animals must be washed and dried prior to entering the ring and placed into chutes.
- 3. Members only will be allowed in the chute area.
- Junior Members will be allowed an older member at chute side to provide guidance. However, no fitting is to be accomplished by the older member.
- No blow dryers will be permitted in the contest area. Clippers, combs, brushes and grooming products (aerosol and spray bottles), are the only equipment allowed.
- To compete for Grand Champion Fitter, first place winners from the junior, intermediate, and senior age groups will have 10 minutes to fit the left side of their animals.
- Showmanship classes will follow immediately after respective fitting classes.

It is recommended all livestock exhibits be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (health certificate) signed by an accredited veterinarian:

PA Cattle, Goats and Sheep – Recommended to have been issued after May 1 current year

All Horses - Required - issued within 30 days of start of fair.

All Swine - Required - issued within 14 days of start of fair.

Out of State Cattle, Goats and Sheep – Required – issued within 30 days of date of importation to the state.

USE CAUTION WHEN FITTING YOUR ANIMALS

Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If your are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it! **IMPORTANT**: If upon slaughter treatment with drugs, bio-logics, or any chemical from fitting products, is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

GOOD HOUSEKEEPING AWARDS

4-H and FFA exhibitors who maintain the most attractive and sanitary exhibits will be eligible for special daily premiums.

Inspections will be made unannounced. Premiums will be awarded to clubs or chapters housing animals in the 4-H and FFA designated areas. There will be no double premiums given.

Animals from one club or chapter must be grouped together to be judged, and the club or chapter exhibitor number must be clearly displayed.

At the 2023 Waterford Community Fair, 13-year-old Madison Link of Waterford took First Place in the Homemade Chocolate Cake Contest, making her eligible to enter the 2024 PA Farm Show competition in January.

Madison and her family traveled to Harrisburg the day before judging with two sets of base cakes, just in case – which turned out to be a good idea – one set got squished by water bottles in the car. Madison, then made the from scratch frosting and ganache in a hotel room and assembled the cake for submission.

At the Farm Show, the made from scratch layered chocolate cakes were judged on flavor, texture, inside characteristics, outside characteristics, and frosting. Of the 79 cakes entered in the competition it was the taste of Madison's cake that put her on top! Along with a First Place Blue Ribbon, Madison was also awarded a cash premium of \$500!

Named "J's Slice of Heaven Cake" Madison describes her cake as a "normal classic chocolate cake" with a peanut butter buttercream frosting. When asked how she came up with the name, Madison responded with "My nickname is 'J' and a friend said the cake was a slice of heaven."
